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CHARACTERS

MARTHA DANDRIDGE portrayed by Antonin Scalia
GEORGE WASHINGTON portrayed by Clarence Thomas

SETTING

 18^{th} -century anti-fornication party / present-day high school auditorium

TIME

1750 / 2012

ACT I SCENE 1

MARTHA: Georgie-porgie, I was so happy we were able to attend the anti-fornication and chastity services together. It was so inspirational—and it aroused normal sexual feeling that I am trying to repress.

GEORGE: *Normally* aroused, yes? Punch?

MARTHA: I think not—I am already overheated from the minister's bible reading and the flaming words of the Day of Judgment.

GEORGE: Sit. Relax in my lap.

MARTHA: Well, that does feel nice. Although, my judgment may be considered legally impaired as defined in several notable cases on the effects of Christian propaganda and alcohol intoxication.

GEORGE: Martha, let us engage in normal coitus.

MARTHA: But I'm only 16, which in most states and the protectorate of Puerto Rico is below the age of consent.

GEORGE: Then I will marry you, and you will honor and obey me. Now, how does this robe unbutton? (*Starts to unbutton Martha's gown*.)

MARTHA: [Standing up] Georgie, have you not noticed the alarming rise in premarital pregnancy and bastardy in 18th-century America? And I hope you do not share the common misconception that a man can rid himself of syphilis by having sex with an uninfected person...

GEORGE: (*Breaking character*) But George Washington believed that gonorrhea was caused by having relations with *oneself*...

MARTHA: Is there no wording in the U.S. Constitution to guide 18th-century American teenagers in legal, not unusual sexual relations?

GEORGE: (*Breaking character*) Unfortunately, George Washington's own sexual practices were not documented by the framers of the U.S. Constitution.

MARTHA: How about birth control in the early American Republic?

What is the legality of condoms made from animal intestines?

GEORGE: (Sighing, getting overheated) Do you not, like your fellow 18th

century Virginians, have the "bawdy Itch of knowing secret Things"? Which is to say, 'Can't we just fool around?'

MARTHA: Fool around how? You are aware of the anti-sodomy laws,

are you not?

GEORGE: The anti-sodomy laws were struck down in Lawrence v.

Texas, my dear!

MARTHA: (Getting agitated, breaking character) But you were a dissenting

opinion in that decision, Justice Thomas and so was I. We believe in originalist sex practices and normal sexual ideas from the 18th century as espoused by the Founding Fathers: one man with his wife—or mistress—or other *not unusual*

property.

GEORGE: In the matter of Martha v. George Washington, I find that the
